Opinion Cards Activity

The cards included can be used in various ways. Here are a few suggestions;

- Play scoot
- Have students fill in their answers and form a continuum in the classroom having students stand where their opinion falls. Have students share their opinions trying to sway students to their part of the continuum.
- Use the cards during the power point presentation for reflections.
- Use the cards as a jumping board into a writing activity.
- Use them as task cards.

Create an Advertisement

Marathon County is known for Ringle Bricks, Wausau Homes, Fromm’s Furs, and Ginseng. You have been commissioned to create an advertisement for one of these companies. It would be a good idea to research previous advertisements to prevent repeating ideas.

Your advertisement should show the company and what creates. It should be colorful and appropriately eye catching. Be sure to include how the item is produced, and where it can be purchased. If you would like to include a slogan, it may help viewers to remember your product.

Designing a Wausau Home

Wausau Homes have been designed since the 1970's. Over the years floor plans have increased in size and number. Homeowners can even customize the home to exactly their tastes. Research the different types of floor plans on wausauhomes.com and notice the different features the homes offer.

You are going to design your own Wausau Home. Ask your teacher if you should use graph paper or printer paper for your final design. Remember to include the important parts of a home including doors, windows, sinks, and toilets.

Compare your plan to the plans on the Wausauhomes.com website, is it similar?

How is your floor plan different from the plans on the Wausauhomes.com website?

Show your floor plan to someone else, did they offer any suggestions? What were they?

What makes Wausau Homes different from other homes in Marathon County?

How do you make bricks?

John Ringle originally built a saw mill in the area we call Ringle today. He quickly found out his land was made of clay and it bogged down his saw mill company. John Ringle did not give up, he closed the saw mill and used the clay to make bricks. As the city of Wausau grew larger buildings were needed. John Ringle supplied the bricks for many of buildings around town. You can tell Ringle Bricks by their burnt orange color.
